## Karl Zerbe He's Reti

Karl Zerbe, Florida State's artist-in-residence, is retiring from his teaching duties at the University, but he will not retire his paint brush and pallette.

Zerbe said, "I'm going to stay here in Tallahassee because I like it here and because I've just added a studio onto my home." The artist, who is retiring for health reasons after 17 years as an art Marshall said, "Not only Professor Zerbe's students, professor at Florida State, added, "I will continue but the University as a whole, will miss a teacher of painting.'

Ackknowledged as one of the masters of contemporary expressionism, Zerbe was the foremost painter in encaustic (painting with hot wax) until 1948.

have studied under him.

After developing a serious allergy to encaustic, he was forced to find other means of creating his major works. After one of his students developed the first plastic paint, polymer tempera, Zerbe turned to this medium and worked with it for 10 years until acrylics appeared. He adopted the medium because it was usable on a wider variety of surfaces and offered more flexibility. Today the artist works mostly in acrylics or a combination of collage and acrylics.

His deep life-long interest in wildlife, and birds in particular, is reflected in current works which include many dramatic images of hirds

many dramatic images of birds.

One project of special interest to Tallahasseeans was the series of twelve Zerbe birds which were silkscreened last year by members of the community at LeMoyne Art Foundation for an exhibit there which received national coverage.

The professor has gained great respect as a

teacher and has enjoyed teaching "tremendously." he said. "I'm very sorry I cannot keep up teaching. I learned more from my students than they've learned from me. They've kept me young."

The German-born artist studied at the Debschitz Art School in Munich with Joseph Eberz and Karl Most American artists working in that medium today Caspar who was a follower of Edvard Munch, an outstanding expressionist of the time. Zerbe also studied at the Munich Academy of Art.

The painter was only 19 when he had his first oneman show in 1922 at the Gurlitt Gallery in his native minima the market

Berlin.

Zerbe's early works were labeled "subversive" and "degenerate" by the Nazi regime and were removed from German Museums in 1934. That same year he emigrated to the United States where he held his first American one-man exhibition at Harvard

He was with the Boston Museum of Fine Arts for 17 years before coming to Florida State in 1954. He is associated with the Lee Nordness Galleries in New York and plans to have a one-man show there next winter. His plans also include a one-man show in Tallahassee at that time

Zerbe's works hang in numerous private collections throughout the country as well as in many of the major art museums.
