Eluster: Artist Bio

Eluster Richardson's art strikes a soulful chord. "Uplifting, inspiring, and enlightening" are all words frequently used to describe the experience. Born and raised in Tallahassee, Florida, Eluster began painting as a young child and currently maintains his studio in his hometown. With a fascination of local history and the people and places of North Florida inspiring the body of his work, it has been long treasured by history and art lovers of the region. He is adept in oil and pencil, but his medium of preference is watercolor.

Eluster has earned a well-respected place in the local art community. He is the Artist-in-Residence for the Riley House Museum and Resource Center of African-American History and Culture, which also houses his historical works collection. Eluster has been involved with LeMoyne Arts for several decades and continues to be a cherished partner. He also previously served as President of the Watercolor Society.

He has received numerous awards for his paintings, including LeMoyne's Chain of Parks Art Festival 2022 "Best in Show". His works have been exhibited in a variety of galleries, including the Museum of Florida History, LeMoyne Art Gallery, Florida State Museum of Art, Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art, and Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. Collections of his work can be seen at the Custom House Museum in Clarkesville, Tenn., Polk County Museum of Art in Lakeland Fla., Riley House Museum/Center, Gadsden Art Center Museum in Quincy, All Children's Hospital in St. Petersburg, Fla., Florida League in Tallahassee and Leon County Libraries (just to name a few). His most recent series of work includes a Quilting Series and a Forgotten Coast Series of landscapes.

Artist Statement:

It is difficult to explain the spirit that haunts and compels me to draw and paint. My journey of hard work and a passion for the arts is ongoing. In my recent quilting series of paintings, there is something fascinating about patches of colors all placed together and bringing those colors together in the rules of composition. The quilting theme is dear to my heart because the quilts you see in many of my paintings are inspired by my mother's quilts.

I like to explore the beauty of how sunlight seems to travel across the marsh grass in landscapes of the Forgotten Coast, inviting the viewer to see a palette of warm colors. There is an intimate, personal moment of reflection through all of my artwork.

Eluster likes painting people because "people are such a challenge," and he especially enjoys painting children. His daughter Jasmine has been the subject of many compelling portraits.

FESTIVAL BACKGROUND

Started in 2001, the Chain of Parks Art Festival was designed to offer the Tallahassee community an outdoor, fine art experience previously not found in the region.

Mary Beth Foss, LeMoyne Executive Director in 2001 initiated the Festival by working with a few local artists. The event got its name from the beautiful downtown Chain of Parks in which it is held.

Starting with about 50 local and regional artists, the Festival was designed to be a diverse fine art experience as well as a vehicle by which the LeMoyne Art Foundation could raise funds for its ongoing exhibitions and art education programs.

After eight years of being planned and organized by LeMoyne staff with assistance from volunteers, the Festival transitioned into a volunteer-driven event. Volunteer Chairs were appointed by the LeMoyne Board. Charles and Cynthia Tunnicliff and Kelly Dozier began to take the Festival to new heights, bringing more artists to the event and broadening the reach through marketing and personal outreach to traveling artists -- this helped to expand the variety and quality of original art displayed in the Festival.

Kelly S. Dozier has served as Festival Chair since 2009 and through visiting other art festivals and keeping an open eye to new ideas, has brought a number of initiatives to the Festival, adding interactive opportunities as well as depth to the experience. Some of those initiatives include: The Village (including community partners and children's art programs), the Jacques Le Moyne Living History Encampment, Greening the Festival, "BetheArt" Photo Opportunities and Pop-up Entertainment. Kelly has also served as Sponsor Chair since 2008, improving the sponsorship experience and bringing in new sponsors to support the festival.

In 2009 Sheri O. Sanderson joined the Festival Committee as Event Manager and brought exceptional event management skills and experience to the team. In 2019 Powell Kreis joined the Festival as its Festival Manager as Sheri transitioned to Artist Relations Manager focusing on recruitment and management of participating artists. Powell has brought new ideas and partners to the festival as she manages the intricate behind-the-scenes planning, writing and managing event funding grants, working with partners, securing licenses, equipment rentals, PR and marketing and much more.

The Festival continues to grow in quality and notoriety. Since 2015 the Festival has been recognized as one of the top 100 Fine Art Festivals in the nation by Sunshine Artist Magazine, notably #1 in 2017, #5 in 2018, #3 in 2019, top 10 in 2020-2021 and #7 (#1 in Florida) in 2022.

Festival Mission: The Chain of Parks Art Festival is established to present an outdoor festival of high-quality original artwork and entertainment for the enjoyment of our Tallahassee area residents and visitors, while fostering the careers and financial support of local and regional artists and raising needed funds for the operation of LeMoyne Arts.

Artists travel from across the nation to display and sell their original works of fine art, bringing a diverse array of fine art for visitors to enjoy and enhance the lives of community members who take a piece of art home. On Saturday three experts in the fine art field, brought in from outside our area for impartiality, serve as judges to identify the best artists' works in each media category. Winners are announced on Saturday afternoon, and on Sunday morning, the winning artists' award ribbons and yellow booth flags are displayed at the festival.

Learn More

The festival continues to have a positive economic impact on our local community. A recent economic impact study showed that festival attendees had an impact of close to 1.3 million dollars on the local community. Last year's Chain of Parks Art Festival drew an estimated 35k attendees to downtown Tallahassee.


